Cotton yields could decrease 17% by 2050




Up to 70% of wine-growing regions could be unsuitable for grapes by 2050

45 species of fish have shifted south due to rising ocean temperatures since 1800s




Agriculture GVP






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Proposed pillars of a national strategy for climate change and agriculture



- **Risk minimisation** = guiding principle
- Methods to mitigate risks:
 - **Strong RD&E,**
 - transition to **clean energy &**
 - **capturing & storing carbon**
- Focus on potential **opportunities** = value proposition

State of play: global & local context


